Liturgical Reflection

In ancient times, anointing was a cultural practice used by shepherds to protect their sheep. The pouring of oil on a sheep's head would make it slippery for insects to cling onto the sheep's fur thereby preventing an infestation. It became a symbol of God's blessing and protection and is associated with a consecration for a divine purpose such as the priestly, prophetic and kingly vocations. By proclaiming that he was the anointed one, Jesus declares that he was chosen by God to bring salvation.

What of salvation do you need? Why was Jesus sent to redeem us? The truth is that we are sinners. Many a time we do not realise that we are dependent on God and with our pride, think we are self-sufficient but are in fact poor with the graces of God. Hence, Jesus was anointed to bring good news to the poor, news that we have a loving Father who is *Yahweb-yireh* (Genesis 22:14, means "the Lord will provide").



The poor in Spirit are the recipients of the good news. They are the imprisoned, blind and oppressed in their lives, the neglected, ostracized of society. Sin holds us captive as slaves. It makes us blind to God's presence for when all we see is our own pain, we lose sight of God. (Ref: The Shack, William P Young)

Situsgical Reflection (con't)

Sin makes us burdened and weighed down. Therefore, God sends us his Son, Jesus, to free us from our sins and save us from all distress. Jesus says "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matt 12:28) Do you believe in your salvation?

The Holy Spirit in Luke's gospel leads, fills and empowers people for prophetic work. Our passage opens with Jesus returning with the Holy Spirit to Galilee from the wilderness. He had just overcome temptation and has been strengthened by the experience. From this experience, he became ready to begin his public ministry and will travel from town to town to teach, heal and live out the living word so that people can see the salvation that God offers. Do you listen to the Holy Spirit and allow him to lead you in your daily life? The Spirit of the Lord rests on us to lead us to proclaim the good news to the poor.

Luke was writing an orderly account to "most excellent Theophilus". "Most excellent" was the title of Theophilus (Θεοφιλος, "lover of God", derived from theos "god" and philos "brotherly love"). Theophilus was a gentile, likely a Roman government official who had previously received some instruction about Jesus. Luke's gospel therefore is directed at believers like Theophilus who need assurance that what they have been taught is truth. Despite the word of God surviving through thousands of years of history, it is to date a difficult teaching to accept. Are you a Theophilus seeking for the truth? Do you believe that Jesus is the living word?

Psa 19:8. "The law of the Lord is perfect, refreshing the soul. The decree of the Lord is trustworthy, giving wisdom to the simple." Heb 4:12 "Indeed, the word of God is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart."

Saint Augustine wrote of a human yearning to move to complete fulfilment. "You have made us for yourself, O Lord," he wrote in his Confessions, "and our heart is restless until it rests in you." It reminds us that perfection can be attained through the grace of Jesus. In St Paul's letters to the Corinthians, we can find the way to perfection by becoming part of the body of Christ, each part graced with individual gits – even our weaknesses. We must realise that we are not alone on our journey to perfection. God has given us his Son, who lives in each and every one of us. By meditating on the word of God, Emmanuel, God with us, we are able to fulfil our yearning. Do we allow God to fulfil his promise in us?

The living word of God is for everyone. It is love poured down from God our Father to us who are his beloved children. This living word is also none other than Jesus, incarnate Son of God. God speaks to us through His word. Today, Jesus is telling us that as the Anointed One, he is the fulfilment of God's promises and with authority has come to save us, to lead Israel back to the law. He fulfils the promise that the Lord has not forgotten His people, even if they have lost their way while yearning for complete fulfilment.

Spend some time with the Lord in scripture today. Let us pray that when we encounter Jesus in our hearts saying "The words I have spoken to you are spirit and life." (Jn 6:63), we may have the same response as Simon Peter did "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (Jn 6:68)

living Our, Bantismal Call

"There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit. To one is given through the Spirit the expression of wisdom; to another the expression of knowledge according to the same Spirit; to another faith by the same Spirit; to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit; to another mighty deeds; to prophecy; to another discernment of spirits; to another varieties of tongues; to another interpretation of tongues. But one and the same Spirit produces all of these, distributing them individually to each person as he wishes." - 1 Cor 12: 4-11

The people of Corinth caused a lot of trouble for St. Paul. While baptised in the Holy Spirit, they had begun to place a hierarchy on the gifts they had received - those whom they had perceived to have received "fewer" from God, they ostracised. They were also rich, proud, and arrogant, and cast the poor aside like stones to be kicked away from the roadside. However, this article is not about a moral exegesis on the lives of the people of Corinth, but a salient reminder to ask ourselves whether we are like or have become the Corinthians.

1 Corinthians 12: 4-11 is also a gentle reminder to us that we are made for more and greater in our lives; That we have been anointed and sealed in the Holy Spirit; That each of us has been gifted with a unique Baptismal Call that the Lord GOD has placed in our hearts.

The problem is this: Over the years, we have forgotten our Baptismal Call, or have tried to suppress it, or have buried it somewhere within us. We have not lived this call and that is the reason why many of us still amble through life, searching for meaning in life. Many of us are searching for God, when ironically, God is already there, in us and with us. Over the years, our Baptismal Call has also been diluted with what the world tells us. It has been tainted with lies and deceit. It has been corrupted by doubt and woundedness. At the end of the day, we begin to tell ourselves that we are not worthy. It does not help that we barely spend time with the LORD, nor read His Word to discern what His Will is for us. Are we so almighty that we can over-ride God's Plan and Will for us? We only know our past, and we do not know what the future holds. Consider also how GOD called the imperfect people: Moses was a stutterer and a murderer, Jeremiah was a youth of a tender age.

What is our Baptismal Call?

First, it is to "Love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself." (Luke 10: 27) and second, to "seek first the kingdom [of God] and his righteousness." (Matthew: 6:33)

Next, it is to know deeply that we are beloved by GOD. As Psalm 100: 3 says, "Know that the Lord, is GOD. It is He who made us, we are His. We are His people, the sheep of His pasture." and again in Jeremiah 31:3, "The Lord approached from afar. I have loved you with an everlasting love, and therefore have continued my faithfulness to you."

What then do we do? The answer is found in Micah 6:8, "You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the LORD requires of you: Only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your GOD."

Peace and GOD's tender mercy be with you.

Setting a Generation of lost youth Free

We are all sinners, and we have been wounded in some way or another.

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord."

– Luke 4: 18-19

For those who know me well enough, they would know that I am currently working in a Catholic Charity, a non-profit organisation which works with boys-at-risk in a residential setting. The youth come from backgrounds - some presenting with the aftermath of trauma, others on Child Protection Order, some having had minor brushes with the law, and mostly those who come in on compassionate grounds - who do not have relatives or parents to give them developmental care. For example, in an Art Therapy session, one of the boys sculpted a sculpture of a headless pregnant woman because he had never seen his mother's face before.

While these youth may appear as tough and gruff, they come from a place of woundedness or neglect, and very often are seeking some form of intimacy, love, and validation. They also present with bamboozled-ly stunning sports, culinary, music, and art portfolios. Some even present unsurpassable talent such as juggling, singing, and impeccable comedic timing.

However, the youth are crying out for help. They are also looking for good mentors, educators, and sojourners who would journey with them and who would believe in them. They also need prayer warriors who would stand in the gap and intercede for them. They need someone whom they can count on in their lives.

A client was baptised an Anglican, but turned to the underground gods favoured by his gang. This was in part due to how he felt that his parents did not love him, and so sought solace in the dizzying world of vice. He felt welcomed and accepted in what the youth term as their "shirt" (gang). He was a minor leader of the pack, and felt useful.

Another child who came in, was baptised a Catholic, but his father was violent and abusive to his wife and his children. Having faced such trauma, he had a wounded perspective of the Catholic faith, and an even more distorted perspective of who God the Father is.

Yet another child had both parents who had been incarcerated. He had spent his childhood moving from one foster home to another foster home, before finally settling in this current organisation.

For another youth, when a social worker did a house visit, she found that he was not getting the proper nutrition he needed, and was only eating instant noodles every day.

These are the everyday scenarios which I encounter in my place of work. For these youth, whose default mode is fight and flight, it is tough to even talk about the concept of love. There is good reason that they are barely motivated to do well in school, for at their tender age, they have greater concerns to worry about.

The LORD GOD, with His impeccable sense of humour has placed me here for a time and season, because He has a plan for me. I don't know what that plan is, but as 1 Peter 4: 8 says, "Let your love for one another be intense, because love [charity] covers a multitude of sins." My brothers and sisters, every prayer counts. Please join me in praying for these whom are God's beloved.

Introduction to Faith, Journaling
